



The Buddha encouraged his disciples to develop the bramavihārā or sublime states of mettā and karuna, or friendliness and compassion toward all sentient beings, to all who seek happiness and avoid suffering. These qualities are therefore non-restrictive and non-exclusive, not restricted or withheld from any being regardless of its actions. We begin, however, by wishing health and happiness to ourselves, so that we will be able to convey them to those around us. Then, we follow by radiating mettā and karuna outward to the ones we care for, and in the spirit of this gathering, especially those to whom we owe gratitude.

<u>Leader</u>: We thank You, O God, for our family and for what they mean and bring to one another.

<u>People</u>: We are grateful for the bonds of loyalty and affection which sustain us, and which keep us close to one another no matter how far apart we may be.

<u>Leader</u>: We thank You for implanting within us a deep need for each other.

People: We thank You for giving us the capacity to love and to care.

<u>Leader</u>: Help us to be modest in our demands of one another, but generous in our giving to each other.
